Saturday 13th April 2018 The Road to Emmaus



Can you imagine the scene on the Emmaus Road?

Two disciples, one named the other not, are walking wearily back to Emmaus; it has been a rollercoaster of a week. We have a great God who is not bound by time, logic, gravity or reason; he is beyond all that, and we are constantly being called to encounter him in the strangest of places – and even where we would least expect it.

The Emmaus Road has come to mean a closer walk with Jesus, learning, discovering, listening, finding! Where will your Emmaus Road be this week, and in whose house will you meet the presence of the risen Christ?

Jesus you walk beside us, and share with us - when we are aware of you and when we are not. Thank you that you come where we are, we don't have to search you out, just long for you. As we receive this gift of being alongside you in our day to day lives, help us not to be selfish, keeping you to ourselves but willing and wanting to share this Good News of your presence with others.
