Travels with our Helen Kim Memorial Scholar, Madeleine Reed

It's May now, as I write, which seems startling to me; it has been both moments and lifetimes since August, when I began my role as Helen Kim Memorial Scholar for Britain. Already, I have done so much.

The biggest thing that has happened for me in my role was, of course, the trip to Brazil in the spring. I had never flown before, never been out of Britain and never been among people who couldn't speak English – then I received the invitation from the World Federation Executives and my life was changed.

Because the World Assembly was on Zoom last year, the World Exec couldn't discuss everything they needed to in their meetings, so they arranged a second Exec Meeting in a beautiful place called Foz do Iguaçu on the border from Brazil to Argentina. They also opened their arms in invitation to the HKM Scholars from around the world.

I was blessed to be able to travel from Heathrow with Heidi, the Scholar from Ireland, and we made fast friends in the airport. The flight – the first flight of my life – was something like eleven hours long, overnight, with two changes at Madrid and Sao Paulo. Thanks be to God – it turns out I love flying!

I was there for four days, although some of the other women stayed longer. When I arrived, we all greeted each other like sisters with hugs and laughter. We exchanged gifts with one another, each having brought something from our own country (I hope nobody minds that I represented Britain with Mint Humbugs), we planned and lead devotions for the Execs together and then all women present, Scholar and Exec alike piled onto a coach and went off to spend the afternoon at the magnificent Iguazu Falls. On my final day, a group of us pooled our resources to pay for a minibus to take us across the border to Argentina for lunch – I was disappointed that I didn't get my passport stamped there, but I'd forgotten my sadness by the time we arrived at the restaurant. Finally, another long overnight flight and many tears shed at our parting.

A couple of months later and another kind invitation had me catching the National Express back to Heathrow for another flight! My second flight – but my first alone. I flew to Cork Airport in Ireland where the Scholar for Ireland, Heidi, met me and drove me to Killarney for the annual Methodist Women in Ireland conference – this was the weekend after our wonderful Swanwick conference and it followed a similar outline. Our keynote speaker was the minister of Killarney Methodist Church, Alison Gallagher, and the theme was 'Nurturing ourselves, each other and the wider church family'. Heidi and I were running a workshop on nurturing the wider church family; we made little 'Kingdom of God' passports and took our attendees on a trip around the world, visiting each of the World Federation areas and stamping their passports as we went. There were some wonderful discussions on justice, community and the practical expressions of love that we are all called to do. The women there were also – unsurprisingly – absolutely lovely and so utterly welcoming.

The dining room at the hotel had large windows facing the mountains. County Kerry is home to the largest mountain range in Ireland and there it was, just beyond the golf course — a strange mix of tame and wild which was a good metaphor, I thought, for how we view and interact with God, trying in vain to tame and manage Him, always overshadowed by His utter wildness (as C S Lewis wrote, 'He's not a *tame* lion, you know').

On the drive back from Killarney to Cork, the sun shone wonderfully down on the mountain roads. During the five minutes of rain we got just before the sun set, we were treated to a complete double rainbow arching over our heads and, as we drove into Cork in the dark, the city lights twinkled below us like an ocean of stars. It was all rather wonderful.

This is a brief overview of all the excitement that God has brought to me, and also the reason why my parents are now calling me a jetsetter.

TAKE & MAKE PROJECT Kirkham Methodist Church Lancashire District



The Take & Make free food table continues to run every week on a Thursday afternoon. We now have a core of regulars who visit every week and really appreciate the extra food which helps to supplement their strained budgets.

The food and other items come from the twice

weekly pickup from Aldi @ Mill Farm through the charity Neighbourly, and the collection from Wesleys at Church Road. It means that we never know from one week to the next just what items we will be given. In the run up to Christmas we got boxes and boxes of mince pies from Aldi. They were obviously last year's stock which was coming up to its sell by date, but they were very popular with our clients. We get lots of broken chocolate eggs, bunnies and other speciality chocolate items; it is still chocolate and still very edible and always goes very quickly!

Through the free food table, we've built up some strong relationships with people who live around the church. Many now come into our warm hub, which has also proved very popular. We open the Church Welcome Hub and offer free hot drinks, free Wi-Fi and lots of chitchat. The warm croissant, which we offer if we have a glut on the food table, are very popular. As were the warm mince pies at Christmas!

This started as a 'Warm Welcome' initiative, following many people's concerns about the cost of running their home heating over the winter period. However, I believe that this should continue as the community engagement is invaluable. Last week we received a visit from Anna, our local Community Police Support Officer, and Jane, the Co-op community Champion. Both were very impressed and were keen to support us in whatever way they could.

Our Take & Make project was set up with the support of Wesleys at Church Road and is a great way for Kirkham Methodist Church to give something to the community, and that aspect is regularly commented on by those visiting the free food table, and people obviously appreciate what we are offering. It has also been great seeing a number of the 'clients' joining us for some

A very successful craftivism event was held in November in the Huddersfield circuit. We would like to thank MWiB for your generous grant of £200 which enabled us to finance it.





Craftivism has been described as "the gentle art of protest" (craftivist-collective.com). Headed up by Sarah Corbett, I particularly like their strap-line, "Changing the world one stitch at a time".

Essentially, craftivism is a non-violent way of protesting, seeking to advance social justice issues though craft projects, notably involving knitting, sewing, crochet etc. To find out more, the Circuit Social Justice Group organised a Craftivism Workshop in November which was led by Anna Bland from Leeds Sanctuary, and held at Lindley Methodist Church. It was well attended, with people from churches around the Circuit and a few from the local community too.

In the first session, Anna introduced us to the concept of craftivism, drawing on her own experience and sharing stories from her work with the Leeds Craftivists group. Her passion was evident, as she highlighted its benefits, describing craftivism as inclusive, empowering and good for well-being. We were encouraged to reflect and share our thoughts in small groups. One of the clearly defining factors is that craftivism begins with the social justice message and it is from that which the campaign is developed and shared through craft.

So how do we put craftivism into practice? Anna illustrated this through sharing the Leeds Craftivists' Cost of Living Campaign. A campaign to lobby the government to prioritise a more sustainable future for everybody through investing in more renewable energy. Long term this would avoid the rising living costs currently being seen across the UK and lead to a fairer greener society. This was explored through a video presentation and discussion, which gave food for thought for our practical session to come after lunch – a time to respond through craft.

We were invited to take part in the Cost of Living campaign through creating a blanket square by knitting, sewing, crocheting and/or using fabric pens to share our message. Each of the 8" squares would be stitched together at a later stage, along with many other contributions from the Leeds Craftivist group. The intention, to create a blanket to give to the Prime Minister as a way of delivering our protest messages. If you weren't so craft orientated, there was also an option to write a letter to your local MP sharing concerns related to this campaign. There are plans for this blanket to go 'on tour' before being presented to the Prime Minister, so hopefully an opportunity to view this collaboration here in our Circuit in the not too distant future.

I feel the Craftivism Workshop was successful in its objectives, and from talking to people afterwards have a sense that many of us came away feeling inspired and equipped. We may not be able to change the world in one go, but maybe we can strive towards social justice "one stitch at a time". This is not the end, only the beginning – watch this space!

Bodies of Faith Webinar Series

The first of this occasional series took place in May. Hosted by Barbara Easton 'In Sickness and In Health' featured two women reflecting on their longstanding experience of healthcare — one as a giver, and one a receiver. Dr Laura Hipple, a Methodist from the North West, has been working as a doctor in the NHS for about 40 years, specialising in women's health and medical training. Rev Charity Hamilton is currently a circuit minister on Teesside. She also spends long periods in acute hospital settings as a patient. Between them they began to spark our thinking about what it means to live out faith in a woman's body, in sickness and health.

Going forward other topics may be around menstruation, menopause and mental health. We want to open up discussion about how our experience as disciples is impacted by our experience as women – specifically, our physical experience of living out the faith amid all the joys, challenges, and issues that come with having the body of a woman. We don't really talk about this aspect of our Christian lives in church and some of the issues have been taboo throughout society over many generations. We want to create a space in which this can maybe be gently opened up and explored.
