'With what shall I come before the LORD, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?' He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to act justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God? [Micah 6:6–8]

I wonder what your favourite passage from the Bible is and why. We all have verses that we draw upon at times in our lives – above is one of mine. I have it on a clock, a picture and engraved on the back of my i-pad. These words from Micah remind me of what God asks of me: it's not all about meetings, coffee mornings, visiting groups, though all of these are important too – it's about the way I live my life in the world.

The passage reminds me that no matter how flowery my words are or how often I attend church, it is the way I act that matters to God. The passage reminds me to work for justice in the world; helping people is one thing, but tackling the injustice is harder and what I am called to do. It reminds me to love completely – not just those I like, but everyone, regardless of who they are. It reminds me that humility, rather than pride is the way to live in the world. The words from Micah are almost a mantra reminding me how to live my life.
