Looking back and looking forward

As I come to the end of my term with MWiB Executive, I must give thanks for the opportunities it has given me. I have met so many wonderful people, been able to travel in reality as well as on Zoom, and had experiences that I had never dreamt would be possible. The pilgrimage to Rome stands out. It is such as rich and amazing city, and we walked a good many of its streets trying to keep up with Rev'd Tim Macquiban who filled us with awe and wonder, not least with his knowledge of the history of Rome.

Then the opportunity to visit Mexico, both the North East and the North West to meet with some amazingly dedicated people applying their faith as well as their practical skills to supporting the migrants on their doorsteps seeking a life of safety where they could access steady work, feed their families and be sure that there were opportunities for education and learning skills. The determination, and faith of the Mexican Christians was so humbling as well as inspiring. Many whom I met had been involved in the work to help migrants for many years, and were determined that they would continue for as long as necessary, even though many of them were not materially wealthy. Issues of human trafficking were highlighted, as the migrants are very vulnerable to being exploited, young unaccompanied children being particularly at risk. So, some of the work focusses on training youngsters to be aware of the dangers and help them develop skills for survival. I travelled with Rev'd Felicity al Hassan who translated from Spanish for me so that I did not miss out on anything. We did not know each other before the trip, but I am so grateful to her for her support and friendship as we shared highs and lows over the days.

Much of my term fell in the pandemic. At first it was 'OK, so what do we do now?' Like many other organisations we discovered Zoom quickly and so learnt new skills and were able to carry on the work of MWiB, albeit in different ways to previously. I wrote a blog virtually every week as a way of keeping in touch with as many people as I could. Often when I sat down to write I was unsure what I would say, but somehow something always came into my mind. I can only think God was at work. The volume of work was maintained, the Trustees Forum meetings happened, and even new partnership formed. The face to face talks and travel across the country was largely replaced by Zoom talks and meetings.

One regret was in having to cancel the 'Swanwick' conference with Jill Baker and Fiona Kendall in 2020 as it was scheduled quite soon after we went into lockdown, and almost everyone was uncertain and wary at that point. However, for MWiB's tenth anniversary in 2021 there was determination to do something and to find a way to celebrate MWiB's first decade, recognising its roots and influences. I was delighted that Sister Imelda Poole was able to lead us, and inform us about the incredible work to reduce human trafficking in Europe from her base in Albania, via Zoom. When I came into the role of President I hoped to raise awareness about the scourge of human trafficking, and the immense suffering that it causes. I have given a number of talks on the subject, but Imelda's work is truly inspiring. I am honoured to be able to call her a friend now.

I am grateful to those who have been colleagues in the Executive team. It really helps when one has a team with whom to share ideas, plan activities, and support one another though the challenges.

People have asked me whether I regret not being able to travel in the ways that previous MWiB President's had done, and it would have been good to see more groups in their own settings, and meet them face to face, but I have no regrets. My Presidency was different, but certainly not worse. So, I thank God for the opportunities it afforded me, the stimulus for learning and finding ways to share. There are some adjustments being made to the ways in which MWiB operates in the future to make it more sustainable, and to encourage all involved in the movement to work more closely together for mutual benefit, as well as reaching a wider audience.

I pray God will continue to guide and inspire women across Methodism, that we work for a world where women have opportunities to be the best that they can be; that we work to fight against injustice wherever we find it, whether that is from positions of quiet actions in our localities or in finding a bigger voice together.

Above all let us continue to follow Christ's example to the best of our ability, and to joyfully share the gospel.

Empowerment Gifts Report

Methodist Women in Britain distribute Empowerment Gifts each year to groups that will make a difference to the lives of women and children across the world.

In 2022 three Gifts were awarded:

- **1**. **Uganda** supporting women with disabilities to start businesses to support themselves 40 ladies and teenage girls in total
- **2**. **Kenya** supporting women to train in tailoring including making re-usable sanitary pads and school uniforms 70 ladies in total
- **3**. **Kenya Methodist Hospital Kitchen Garden Project** teaching women to garden and maintain a kitchen garden to provide food for themselves -30 women to be supported

Below are some of the comments we received from the groups:

1. 'Words cannot express our sincere appreciation to Methodist Women in Britain for your trust and support in entrusting and giving Concern for Neighbours and Community Empowerment (CONECE) with funds and giving us the privilege and opportunity to reach out to disabled women and teenage mothers through enhancing their well-being and creating an enabling environment where they can realize their potential to be able to deal with pressing socio-economic issues that affect their day-to day wellbeing and participate in community development in the communities of Iganga and Kamuli districts.

Your kindness and generosity will remain with CONECE forever but most especially in the lives of the disabled women and teenage mothers that will be supported. At CONECE we cherish working together through partnerships to build the kingdom and share God's love in a needy world. We have identified all the beneficiaries for our project in the targeted communities, carried out validation and verification to ensure that those selected are those that need the support most. We have also conducted a community awareness workshop to sensitize communities on the needs and rights of people with disabilities so that the community can give support.'

- **2**. 'This is wonderful news. Many thanks for the kind gesture and how grateful we are for the support that MWiB have extended to Friends of Kianjai.'
- **3**. 'This donation will be used for kitchen garden project which involves visiting the family by a member of our staff, buying the gunny bags, the seedlings, and the water. It is particularly relevant at the moment as we are facing the worse drought for 40 years and people are really suffering. Animals are dying because of lack of grass to eat. We can offer some help through this project to the poorest of the poor.'

If you know of a project that might benefit from an empowerment grant this year look for the application forms for 2023 which will be available from the MWIB website from the 1st April. Completed forms need to be received by the 31st July.

With the support of Rev Inderjit Bhogal the remainder of the money raised by MWiB for India has now been used as you will see in this report from Bishop Somantaroy Pradeep, Diocese of Amritsar.

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT REPORTS

The Socio Economic Development Project of the Diocese of Amritsar has been working with women from the marginalized communities in the India-Pakistan border areas of Punjab, India, with support from Methodist Women in Britain. These efforts are mainly channeled through the formation and promotion of groups of ten or more women known as Self-Help Groups. The women are sometimes provided with a seed amount which they can utilize, in addition to the pool of their monthly savings, for starting a small business or meeting their needs. For example, the wages of a person who cleans cow dung and takes care of the animals are tiny. But when the women participate with SHG, they can earn up to an additional Rs. 100 per day. This enables them to contribute between Rs. 2000 - Rs.2500 to the family income per month. The project has not only helped the women increase their household income, but has also improved the overall wellbeing of their families, themselves and the whole village community.

Some details of each of the Self-Help Groups, engaging with entire villages are given below:

- **1. Mehak Self Help Group, Singhpura -** All the members are involved in bag stitching and pickle making work and marketing their products in local markets. They were able to procure a bank loan. Now they have enhanced their income through these works and are living a happy life, less dependent on loans.
- **2. Ekta self Help Group, Dujjowal-** They are also fully involved in bag stitching work and marketing their products at local markets, setting up stalls in the different Diocesan level programmes and also diocesan institutions are helping to sell their products.
- 3. **Sukhmani Self Help Group, Bhalapind**-They are involved in bag making and pickle making work. They are selling their products at local markets. It has strengthened the group and attained the maturity to have linkage with the bank.
- **4. Nari Shakti Self Help Group, Abusaid-** The group is involved in making pickles, knitted items, and washing detergent. They have started this business at a small scale and marketing their products at local markets. Now their family income has increased and they are sending their children to schools regularly.

WORK WITH DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN

16 Leadership Development Training Centres(LDTC) for Rural Children are running in 14 villages. 490 children who are studying in the local government schools attend these centres in the evening. Children are also taught good habits like washing hands before and after meals and also after going to toilets, respect in relationships, to be punctual, to take bath every day, teeth cleaning in the morning and before going to bed etc.

IMPACT ON THE COMMUNITY

The community is involved in the programmes. Women Self Help Groups are very active members of the education committees. They regularly keep in touch with the schools as well as with centres.

What is difficult to ascertain from the report is that the four village projects involve whole villages. I have seen this on visits. It is remarkable work.

Ordinarily the women receive something like 50p a day from picking/cleaning cow dung, and forming this into cooking fuel packages. The Diocesan projects support them to also make mango/lime pickles, and to learn stitching and making clothes. The Diocese projects also buy sewing machines for households to become more self reliant.

This is regular ongoing work. The MWiB support is invaluable. The Diocese is truly grateful. The Diocese of Karimnagar continues to work with refugee women and children, again another

entire village. The Diocese also runs a school for refugee children. Again, I have seen this work when I visited the area with a Youth Exchange group visit from the UK funded by Global Relationships. It is truly impressive.

Again, the MWiB support is invaluable.
