Fund raising 2023/2024

Fund raising September 2024 to August 2025



This year we will be fundraising for Hope Church which meets in the old Coop Buildings in Loftus, East Cleveland. Emma Dacey the Lay Worker for the project came to our meeting at Great Ayton and introduced the project to us and the work they do.

Hope4EastCleveland is a project set up by the Lay Worker for the Cleveland and Danby Circuit. It aims to support the local community offering a a variety of services and activities supporting children, young people and families including; weekly youth groups and kid's clubs, holiday clubs and activities, toddler groups, community grocery, food bank, holiday hunger relief, and a school uniform bank amongst other activities support with debt management and mentoring and support programmes.

In September Emma sent us an update:

'We are starting to get back into the Autumn programme following a very busy summer of mission. Our weekly groups and sessions will be returning in the Autumn, I have attached a handy guide for our 'Whats on' for you to have a look at. You are welcome to come along and drop in, may I suggest the welcome space sessions are a great place to come and see what is going on.

The summer mission has seen around 97 young people involved in

Christian based activities over the summer break, where we have been able to engage and share the gospel message. We are now looking to build on these relationships into the Autumn term.

A big push for us this Autumn is prayer; we are looking at how we can develop intentional prayer opportunities at the margins and in a variety of ways. This will be through our weekly groups but also setting up prayer spaces.

In terms of support, we are looking at developing more opportunities to engage with young people and families, to be able to share both hospitality and Gospel alongside each other. Funding for these would be very much appreciated, such as our first light party, we were hoping to have young people come into the building on Halloween to share in the message of Christ being in the light. This is alongside our family festival around a harvest theme, where families often have their first engagement with Bible teaching and stories.

We will also be holding our Christmas mission in mid to late December, this year is *Step into Narnia*, and we are praying more schools, groups and families engage this year. We are setting an ambitious target of sharing the Christmas Gospel message with over 500. Prayers for this work would be very much appreciated. I also encourage you as groups to book to come to *Step into Narnia* and join us this Christmas.

Also as the news of the rising energy price cap comes into the news, pray for our community grocery over the winter, as we know demand increases at this time of year. We are now supporting over 300 households each week, which has a huge cost to the church.

I would love to come out to speak to groups, and can do this where possible around work. I am available on Mondays and Wednesday usually during the day, in the evenings it's Tuesday and Thursday. Most of all, please pray, hold us as a team, our families and young people, in your prayers.'

Since our last newsletter we have been informed that some MWiB members have died. Shared memories of these women are reproduced below

Remembering Ruth Willett: 6 March 1940 - 5 August 2024



Ruth joined the congregation at Barnard Castle Methodist Church upon her retirement from nursing in 1998 when she moved to her bungalow at Stainton. Ruth had risen to the top in her career of nursing, a Matron and later Head of Nursing Services at Pinderfields Hospital, Wakefield.

Ruth was a kind-hearted no-nonsense Yorkshire lass who quickly got to the nub of a problem. She quickly identified loneliness issues amongst

older people in her neighbourhood and congregation and so regularly opened her home offering a delicious homecooked meal and fellowship. Her baking was renowned, she was the first to instigate a monthly Sunday service followed by afternoon tea.

For many years Ruth was my prayer partner and taught me much by her deep faith and caring concern for others, she was a prayer warrior. Our long telephone conversations always finished with a chat about dogs, who she adored, especially her favourite Beagle.

Many of you will remember Ruth from Minsteracres, she never missed prior to Covid, always a bright smile and a cheery word for everyone. It was during the pandemic that Ruth's health failed, unable to care for herself, she spent the last four years in a care home at Bishop Auckland. She will be sadly missed by those she tutored and mentored, family, friends, neighbours and her church family.

Remembering Margaret Wearmouth: 24 November 1938 - 25 July 2024



I was honoured to speak at Margaret's Thanksgiving Service on 15th August about her role in the various women's movements within the Methodist Church over the last fifty plus years in the Darlington District listed below.

1980's Secretary Darlington District Women's Fellowship In 1987 Network was founded and Margaret became Darlington District Network Secretary, ten years later becoming Darlington District Network President 1997-98.

Margaret always had a passion for Women's Work and Mission becoming the District Money Secretary over thirty years ago. She understood how vital our giving is to the Mission Fund and over the last ten years took the lead in the Darlington Circuit, planning the Easter Offering Service, to support Mission Partners Overseas. In late February of this year she called a planning meeting and intended to take the leaders role, however a fall just before Easter resulting in a broken hip, prevented her from taking part. Margaret's fall and subsequent operation affected her heart, which sadly did not recover.

Personal tributes were sent by many women from across the District who had worked with Margaret and valued her mentoring and gentle persuasive ways, friendship and Christian love. A Local Preacher for over 25 years she will be sorely missed, not only by her husband John, their four children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, but by many congregations and our MWiB sisterhood.

Remembering Dorothy Hutton

There are many Church and Circuit Committee members who will recall Dorothy's many years of involvement with Women's Work, Network and MWiB at local level.

Since the late 1950s and early 1960s, Dorothy was constantly active in the Methodist Church in Redcar, within the Circuit and the wider Darlington District.

Dorothy and her husband Len joined West Dyke Church in Redcar, where she remained a member until it closed in 2001 and she then transferred to Marske Church. Dorothy was a Church Steward at West Dyke and also very much involved in the various Women's meetings and organisations, including Women's Work and the Ladies Fellowship meeting on a Tuesday evening. The Women's Own group for older ladies met on an afternoon.

Since Women's Network of the Methodist Church came into being in 1987 and was succeeded by Methodist Women in Britain in July 2011, Dorothy was involved one way or another at Church, Circuit and District level throughout. She was Circuit Secretary: she was District Network Secretary and continued as District MWiB Minutes Secretary until 2019 – yes, 2019 when she was well into her 90s; she helped to run the Marske Women's Network group; she attended and no doubt organised mid-week conferences for Network and later MWiB at Brockley Hall in Saltburn and then latterly weekends at Minsteracres.

Sheila Jones told me:

I have been thinking about Dorothy Hutton and the one thing that always comes to mind about her is how efficient she was! I know that she knew and taught shorthand but the speed with which she took the minutes at any meeting, and joined in with the conversation at the same time, and then typed them up and sent them out was just incredible. She was always humble about it, though, and said that anybody could do it really, if they tried. She never saw it as a special gift.

Dorothy also made arrangements for and supported the ecumenical Women's World Day of Prayer annual services.

Throughout all of this time, Dorothy continued to support and encourage those alongside whom she held office; indeed the aims of Network were to encourage, to equip and to enable – qualities that Dorothy herself embodied. Always ready to lend a hand, to write an encouraging note and to listen and advise. Dorothy was supportive and encouraging, enthusiastic about so many things as we've heard and most of all, it was agreed by everyone I've spoken to – she was somebody who was very good at getting things done – and done right! And I believe that everything was done in faith and for love of Her Lord and Saviour.

I conclude with these words from the letter of Paul to the Ephesians 2: 7-10 "Made alive in Christ" from The Message translation: Now God has us where He wants us, with all the time in this world and the next to shower grace and kindness upon us in Christ Jesus. Saving is all His idea, and all His work. All we do is trust Him enough to let Him do it. It's God's gift from start to finish! We don't play the major role. If we did, we'd probably go around bragging that we'd done the whole thing! No, we neither make nor save ourselves. God does both the making and saving. He creates each of us by Christ Jesus to join Him in the work He does, the good work He has got ready for us to do, work we had better be doing.

And from Ephesians 3: 20+21 (NIV): Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.

In 2010 Alan and I visited Ripon Cathedral which was hosting the Holocaust Memorial art installation called 6 Million+, Every Person



Counts. The artwork is made up of six million buttons, each one representing someone killed in the Holocaust.

Last October we were horrified at the actions of Hamas against Israel. While we were still trying to take in what happened on October 7th in Israel, we were immediately faced with having to grasp what Israel has done to Gaza in response.

This is my personal response to events, my lament to express my grief. I am often tonguetied, struggling to put what I feel into words, but earlier this year I had the idea of how to put it into something visual. I decided to use beads stitched to strips of ribbon. Each bead represents a person killed, a beloved child of God, made in

God's image. It isn't finished, but I am not sure what 'finished' will look like.

Other people's words are often helpful and last Sunday preachers at the morning and evening service both chose hymn 103 from Singing the Faith. Verse 2 says:

God is Love: and he, enfolding all the world in one embrace, with unfailing grasp is holding every child of every race.

And when human hearts are breaking under sorrow's iron rod, then they find that selfsame aching deep within the heart of God.
