


## **Winter Newsletter 2024**



### World Federation News Barbara Easton

One of the great joys of being a Methodist Woman (in Britain) is being part of a fellowship that is worldwide. Every year we celebrate this with the World Fed Day – shorthand for the 'World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women'. It's a day that brings together women from all over the country to think about something with a World Church theme.

This year, we did something a little different. Instead of talking with one another about the challenges of global living, we invited a speaker from the Global South to take our day. Out leader was Dr Nancy Day, a British Kenyan woman, worship leader and musician.

The theme was 'embodied worship' under the title of the old song, 'You Put Your Whole Self In'. Nancy has recently completed a PhD in music contrasting the differences in the responses to music she sees in African and European people. She's well placed to know about this as she trained as a classical performer in Kenya, singing Mozart operas on the stage. The differences she sees in the general approach to music she also sees in the way we respond through music in our worship. European people, she argues, do music (and the rest of worship) largely in their heads. But African people live out Paul's words in Romans 12:1 that our whole bodies should be offered to God – 'this is your spiritual worship'.

So we spent the day singing and dancing and praying – giving ourselves permission to be more free in the ways we express our spirituality in church. Actually, for many women it wasn't the physicality that was new; rather, people shared their anxieties about the responses of the congregation around them when they act with greater freedom. The day liberated people to be more confident about their bodies in worship. It also gave us time to enjoy Paul's writing as we used the framework of one of Nancy's African worship songs to set his words to music. St Paul has always seemed a bit severe to me, so I am not sure what he'd have thought to see this roomful of women laughing happily as they wrestled with metre, rhythm and Romans! But, through this, we came to understand

But, through this, we came to understand Paul more deeply...



It also challenged some of our pre-conceptions. Nancy showed a video she had made in her father's village in rural Kenya. A little elderly woman was dancing her heart out, lost 'in wonder, love and praise'. 'How do we react to this?', we were asked. To be fair, I think most of us thought what one bravely said: 'It looks more like she's in a nightclub than in a church'. Nancy helped us to understand that, in this, African perceptions were very different from European perceptions. In a traditional church in England the woman would probably be looked on askance; through an African lens, she was a

paragon of spirituality.

I was a great day, partly because Nancy is a great spiritual leader as well as musical genius. She fills her talk with spiritual and scriptural insight, as well as knew knowledge and a lot of fun. At lunchtime, we were delighted to be able to use the Stamford Second Helpings café. The fellowship and the food were great – the puddings came from M&S!

### Helen Kim Memorial Scholar Report Madeleine Reed

As winter now steadily approaches, I have entered into my third year as Helen Kim Memorial Scholar. As of August, I am now halfway through my term.



October is always the busiest month of my year now; this year I had three

MWiB events in quick succession, and was left rather winded and exhilarated at the end of it. Firstly, there was the Trustee Meeting in Derbyshire. This was particularly interesting, since not only are we still adjusting to recent changes in the structure of MWiB, but we were also welcoming in Leanora Wassell, our new CoChair, replacing Ruth Parrott.

After spending the weekend with the Trustees up in Derbyshire, I had the Celebration Day for my home district, Southampton, the following weekend. This was held in Verwood, and it was wonderful to see Leanora Wassell there as well, as she had travelled down from Harrogate to share with us! The MWiB Southampton District has named Leprosy Mission as our charity of the year, and we were very blessed to have Gabby North come and speak to us about the work they are doing in India and Nepal, in keeping with the theme of the day, which was *Beauty for Brokenness*. I also had a short segment after lunch where I shared my testimony about how God led me to become a Christian in 2016, and a Helen Kim Memorial Scholar in 2022.

The very next weekend was the World Federation Day. This was held in Stamford, Cambridgeshire, so I booked a hotel and stayed there two nights so I wouldn't have to drive home in the darkening autumn evening. The theme of the day was *You Put Your Whole Self In*, and was led by the wonderful Dr Nancy Day, who guided us through a practice of embodied worship, inspired by her Kenyan background. I was excited for this day as it was unlike anything I've done before, and also spoke to the Methodist heart in me that just wants to have music playing at any given time! I was very moved to see all the women (and men) who had come getting stuck in, dancing to some wonderful Swahili worship songs and a jazz rendition of the *Hokey Pokey* — which led to some interesting conversations about the different names the song is known as in different areas. The fellowship was, as always, exemplary, and we were served, amid laughter, a delicious hot meal by Second Helpings, which is a pay-as-you-feel café dedicated to reducing food waste, open at the church every Saturday. It was a real pleasure worship at a church that had such an inspiring display of dedication to waste reduction and serving the community.

After those three consecutive weekends full of delight and adventure, I am now enjoying the brief respite before Christmas comes crashing in with all the hectic excitement of the season. I only have one World Federation Day left before my term ends in August 2026; I plan to make the absolute most out of the two years I have left, and of course to never forget a single moment of any of it.

In August, I got an email from Maggie saying that the BBC will be contacting me about an interview to do with Primitive Methodism. Not being a Methodist in upbringing I quickly Googled the subject. Fascinating! It turns out I would happily sit with that label. Known as "Ranters" or "Enthusiasts", I would definitely consider myself as an enthusiast. You hadn't noticed? I digress.

I first had a telephone conversation with a production assistant and then a zoom call with the producer. I was deemed suitably knowledgeable (thanks Google) and invited to go to Runswick Bay to meet Ben Robinson and be interviewed by him. How exciting. I said yes as I am keen to make MWiB more visible. I decided to make it into a bit of a retreat and booked myself into an AirBnB.

On the day I booked a taxi and set off on my TV debut. When I arrived I wend my way to the High Chapel, now a residence, and met all the team. I was made to feel totally at ease and had wonderful conversations with them all, including the couple who now own the Chapel. I was interviewed for 30 mins by Ben and spoke about the foundation of Methodism as a justice movement rather than a church. Women were included, leading Classes and even preaching, thanks to Mary Bosanquet. However when he died, as a now established church it was deemed unseemly for women to preach. I shared the fact that Primitive Methodism was born out of a desire to return to the roots of speaking in the open air to the working classes and including women as preachers and pastors. Once again, a justice seeking movement. I spoke about how the movement was involved in education, social justice, better wages, and employment rights. That all were welcome in God's kingdom. Does that sound familiar to you?

In the end, the interview was condensed into 3 minutes but it did include the fact that Methodism is a justice seeking movement. The Church and to some extent, Methodist Women in Britain are concerned about falling numbers. That people are not coming to us and joining in our activities is a worrying matter for many. However I was reminded by this experience that we are a movement and not a fixture. So I look forward to moving around the Connexion, sharing our message and mission, to all who will listen.

### Meeting with the Mothers Union

Following an introduction from past MWiB President Hilary Evans I have been meeting with the Provincial President for the Mothers Union, Kathryn Anderson. Kathryn attended our conference at Swanwick earlier this year and I was invited to their conference at High Leigh in November. Kathryn had presented feedback from her time with us.

I was given a warm welcome and invited to share in all the activities including MU bingo... not my specialist subject! It was good to explore the similarities and differences between the two organisations. I learned about two current projects, one on domestic violence and one on the family. I was able to meet national and international delegates to discuss areas of common interest. Like us they are still rebuilding post covid and keen to increase the numbers of younger women involved.

I presented a snapshot of MWiB followed by a question and answer session which teased out issues for both organisations. They are a membership organisation and each member pays subs so were intrigued by our automatic inclusion. Both organisations have an emphasis on empowering women and found our approach to empowerment gifts and the role of Helen Kim scholarships interesting.

Sadly as my talk concluded news broke of the resignation of Archbishop Justin Welby which formed a challenging background for a session on safeguarding training.

Worship and bible studies were available at the beginning and end of each day. I was invited to lead morning prayers on Wednesday morning.

There was a clear desire on the part of the Mothers Union for a continued dialogue with MWiB where similar goals exist and that there is scope for meaningful dialogue in the future.

Each year Methodist Women in Britain donates money to give as Empowerment Gifts to projects overseas which will make a difference to the lives of girls and women. They are as varied as each of the recipients involved but all will empower, enable, equip and educate them. Since 2016 MWIB has awarded Empowerment Gifts to a wide range of women and children living in the following countries:-

The Gifts have ranged between £500 and £5,000 and have covered a multitude of activities to help women and children to be educated, to have better health, to earn a living by learning a trade and to be able to feed themselves and their families and their communities. There have been 43 projects across the countries mentioned previously that have made a difference to their lives.

What an achievement from the women in the British Methodist Church.

And this year, MWIB have awarded Gifts to projects in the following countries – Uganda (3 different Project partners), Bethlehem and Palestine and Kenya with Gifts ranging from £1,050 and £4,600. We will hear more from them next year.

3 of last year's projects were:

**Conece in Uganda**. We gave £5,000 in 2023 to help disadvantaged women with disabilities providing essential resources, skills training and opportunities for them to thrive in spite of the many challenges they face. They state that our support means more than words can convey and serves as a beacon of hope for these resilient individuals striving for independence and self sufficiency.

**Fiji Centre for Gender and Social Justice**. We gave £2,440 in 2023 to help 12 women to complete the Practical Pastoral Care course. They were able to fund another two women from their own resources. Most of the women attended from the Suva region but two travelled from the other side of the island. They thank MWIB for giving each of them the opportunity to receive the training which they will use in their churches and communities they are part of and it has opened doors to women from the wider community and provided a strong connection to the Methodist Church, the largest denomination in Fiji.

**Togo Methodist Church**. We gave £1,981.33 in 2023 to raise awareness of hygiene practices, access to sanitation of drinking water in the Bas-Mono District. This has included treatment of river water into drinking water, the preparation and use of oral re-hydration solutions, household waste management to limit the impact on the environment and climate, to encourage vaccination of children and provide first aid packs.

What a difference we, the Methodist Women of Britain, have made to women and children who we will never meet.

I have just received another couple of messages from Delia who is the new president of the Bolivian women. I have translated the messages (see below)

Good morning Sister Ruth, I greet you in the name of our Lord. We are almost finished with the kitchen in Tabita. Sister Ruth, I would like to always thank you for doing everything possible for the Bolivian women, beloved sister. We are also holding a Thanksgiving service in Tabita to do the finishing work on the first floor because we need to have the training rooms for the women. We are holding this service, this Thanksgiving service so that the brothers and sisters can help us with bricks and cement with whatever they can and so we will move forward, sister. With your help, we will achieve it. Sister, I am sending you this video to share with you as well, beloved sister, so that you can also share it with the other sisters who do everything possible with their offerings of love for us. May the Lord always be with you and pour out many blessings on all of you, beloved sisters from Great Britain. Thank you all. Receive greetings and hugs from Bolivia.

With a lot of love, selflessness and solidarity together we can do great things, let us remember that the Lord blesses the cheerful giver

I would like to say a big thank you to all the executive team members.

### A request for help from Methodist Women in Britain

I am contacting you from the charity Hamlin Fistula UK. We work to end preventable childbirth injuries in Ethiopia by providing women with access to free, life-changing treatment and quality maternal healthcare. #### Social Media Ruth Dawson MWiB Media Officer

Most of us are more than aware of the power of social media, albeit that many of us struggle to keep up with the ever-evolving trends, new platforms and new languages that appear alongside each one. MWiB Trustees undertoo



and new languages that appear alongside each one. MWiB Trustees undertook several discussions over the course of 2024 regarding the use of our social media. We had a closed Facebook page, a twitter account that we couldn't access, and YouTube attached to an previous exec members personal account.

Although all women in the Methodist church are technically members of MWiB, many are unaware of the many different projects currently supporting other women in our own countries as well as more globally. Many are unaware of how they can access financial support from our grants process. Since Elon Musk bought out Twitter there are issues; many people are voting with their feet, leaving twitter for the more modern Threads.

If we are to maintain our presence on an ever-moving playing field, we need, as an organisation, to keep up. If we wish to attract women of all ages, and allies the same, there is a need to ensure we are comfortable in the technological age. The Executive and those who may require it now have free access to the online design tool Canva, which will enable us to create professional-looking media across the social media platforms, as well as posters, slideshows, event flyers, infographics to name a few.

On the 25th November 24, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women, MWiB launched both an open Facebook page and a Instagram page along side our first major social media campaign #16DaysOf Activism.

The closed Facebook page, though useful for many, only allows those who are members access. This makes it impossible to share projects & ideas across other socials, into church pages or other Facebook pages which maybe useful allies. It also mean individual members cannot share their work across multiple sites as they may wish.

The Open Facebook page will enable others to see the wonderful projects many MWiB Groups are undertaking, it will be easy to share across multiple sites and into Church / Circuit / District and dare I say it even Connexionally! Those who are allied with the work we undertake will be able to view the work we do, and offer advice and support where needed. As an open page, we cannot prevent anyone from observing the work we are undertaking. There is the risk of those who don't agree with us making their point. We are not against this challenge; in fact it is often in challenge that many projects develop and move forward. We are aware that we may be open to challenge that is inappropriate to the site. As Admin to the page we will endeavour to ensure that any inappropriate remarks or behaviour are removed and blocked as soon as possible.

To coincide with the launch of the new Facebook page, we also launched a new Instagram (IG) page. These two pages are linked to each other, making sharing of news easier. For those who prefer this method of social media can find all the information they need to support the projects they are undertaking.
